TOGETHER IN DIGNITY

In our society the right to human dignity is on the table in various different contexts. In general, however, people have no means and perhaps we are reluctant to talk about loss, illness and death as experienced in real life. People's attitude towards situations involving passing away, death and loss is also reflected in their interpersonal relationships, as the communication of such topics is often restrained.

During my work I often witness how difficult it is to experience loss and difficult moments, and move on. The sense of "not being alone" may show a way out to many, and this is why I believe in open discussion when loss is realized and treated. I am proud of our social awareness programme established a decade ago with the help of professionals in Debrecen, which set itself the goal to teach children in kindergartens and primary schools how to provide care. We have a general and lifelong need for dignity and respect for each other. We are aiming to strengthen social skills and, develop emotional intelligence, so that the taboo of death could be collectively overcome and the meaning of life discovered.

We have taken several important measures: nearly one hundred thousand pupils and teachers in dozens of educational institutions, and several cultural institutions joined the Field of Dignity Programme, the transfer effect of which can still be felt. Together, we were involved in mass community movements like the Narcissus Run for the respect of human dignity, the daffodils planting events, the literature contest and Advent recipe competition. Even though the Field of Dignity Programme was rounded off in 2017, this formative initiative is still kept alive by social demands: we annually organise the Dignity Running Festival and Dignity Day to express our respect for and compassion towards patients with terminal illness. The wide-ranging effects of our awareness programme are evidenced by the 2017 launch of the Hospice Palliative and Therapeutic Ward at the Kenézy Gyula Hospital of the University of Debrecen with 20 beds.

WHY?

The Field of Dignity social awareness programme was modelled on the Krakow and English initiatives in 2007 with the goal to help kindergarten and primary school children process the experience of loss and teach them how to provide care through the symbolism of the daffodil. At the same time it was aimed as a general mental and social awareness programme to reach out to as many people as possible with the message of acceptance, understanding, hospice mindset and importance of human healthcare.



BEGINNINGS? GOALS?



From the lack of information and ignorance towards acceptance. Several dozens of institutions joined throughout the county, and the programme raised several thousand people's attention to the importance of care, as well as to the presence and availability of hospice nursing. The major achievement of this decade-long effort was that in 2017 we set up the Hospice and Palliative Therapeutic Ward with 20 beds in the Kenézy Gyula Hospital of the University of Debrecen. The "Field of Dignity" educational and training programme is available for active teachers, psychologists and mental hygiene specialists under the framework of a 30-hour accredited training.

HOW DID THE PROGRAMME REACH OUT TO THE TARGET GROUP?

The programme was implemented simultaneously at three different, **institutional, inter-institutional and municipal,** levels, communicating the main messages in a coherent way.

At the institutions we organised thematic discussions and activities, accompanied by creative inter-institutional events with talent support and developmental aspects, mainly based on an artistic concept (e.g. literary and graphic competitions), and other urban events mobilising several thousands of people (e.g. running competitions).



THE PARTICIPANTS?

The programme's principal target group included kindergarten and primary school children (mainly in forms 3 and 4), while the secondary target group consisted of teachers, parents and families. The project involved a broad cross-section of society: the non-governmental sector as well as the municipality and the educational district. The programme received professional support from professionals of the University of Debrecen, as well as from renowned psychologists and mental hygiene experts. Educational institutions, parent collectives, families and cultural institutions (Csokonai Theatre, Vojtina Puppet Theatre, Kölcsey Centre, Méliusz JP County Library) were also involved. The Field of Dignity Programme, however, found supporters also in the private and entrepreneurial sector. The participants' attitudes to the subject matter were mutually influential factors: a certain transfer effect was realised between the patients and their families, their closer and broader environments, the doctors, the health care employees, the media, the children and their institutions, the average public, the municipalities, the decision-makers and the entrepreneurial sector.

The teachers involved in the programme – learning about new methods – could adequately react to and support the children's behaviour, school achievements, moods and attitudes towards their peers in relation to the experience of loss.







DAFFODIL PLANTING

In the framework of the Field of Dignity Programme, a community event of daffodil planting was organized every autumn for 10 years... The daffodil (Narcissus) is a worldwide symbol of care and compassion, and one of the main emblems of empathy for terminally ill patients. Each institution participating in the programme was represented at the daffodil planting event.



In addition to the daffodil planting, the spring daffodil picking event has also become popular. Each year, volunteering students pick several hundreds of the yellow harbingers of spring, gather them into bouquets, and then distribute them at the Debrecen Hospice and Palliative Therapeutic Ward, as well as in Debrecen's old age nursing homes. The daffodil is a symbol of life, hope, overcoming death, love and affection.





LITERATURE CONTEST

Writing honestly on our feelings, thoughts, fears, pain or joy is one of the most courageous acts in life. Several hundreds of applications are submitted every year to the literature contest organized around the subject matter of dignity. Applicants wove their ideas around thematic quotes such as 'Each minute is of value', 'Everything that is loved becomes beautiful' or 'You need music because it embraces you'. The competition in poetry and prose categories was each year been open to primary school pupils (from the first to the eight form), as well as to high school students in.

ADVENT RECIPE COMPETITION

'Feeding, cooking, nurturing are pillars of care. When we cook or cater for others, we take care of them. This is true whenever a baby is born, and it is still true when one can't cater for themselves anymore or get out of bed and they need help.' – Gyöngyi Porkoláb, founder of the Field of Dignity Programme.

The Advent recipe competition organised in the Christmas season also abounded in miracles. The Christmas-themed 'applications' included among others a video recipe, a menu in an exquisite picture frame arriving on a paper sledge and tasty treats wrapped in tracing paper.





SCHOOL YEAR CLOSING BARBECUE

Throughout the decade, the school year closing barbecue has also become a tradition which is organised as a year-closing event in the framework of the Field of Dignity Programme, with the participation of the institutions involved in the programme.

DAFFODIL CAMP

The children in the thematic camps of the Field of Dignity Programme learnt to manage conflicts so that they can face potential future difficulties more easily. Naturally the focus was on games, sports and trekking, but development trainings also accompanied the programmes on the camp's agenda. Pupils from the institutions involved in the Field of Dignity Programme participated in the camp free of charge.



WEEK OF DIGNITY

The event entitled Week of Dignity that closed the Field of Dignity Programme reached out to several thousands of people. A professional day filled with personal accounts and experiences, arts programmes, theatrical and puppetry performances based on the theme of human dignity, picking and gifting daffodils, a jubilee literature contest, as well as film screenings made the Week of Dignity more colourful. The event series celebrating the 10th anniversary of the programme was supported by renowned artists and cultural institutions such as Attila Till, István Csutka, the Csokonai Theatre and the Nagyvárad Szigligeti Theatre. The week's events called attention to the fact that we are obliged to pay our respect to human dignity.





DIGNITY DAY

Dignity Day has been organized around All Saints' Day since 2018. Dignity Day was made more interesting with a human chain of children, a joint walk of several hundred people with yellow flowers along a defined path, a community run, and daffodils and tealight holder making workshop. The event, which was unique in Hungary, was supported by several primary schools with their own creative programmes, expressing their respect for patients suffering in terminal illness.

HOW CAN ART BE RELATED TO LETTING ONE GO?

Csokonai Theatre's drama titled "Oscar and the Lady in Pink" was born as a result of a close brainstorming with cultural institutions, which was put on stage at the National Theatre too. What did the play give to those involved?



What did this play give me? A new friend, insight into another world, tranquillity, joy, sense of freedom — which I had not felt for a while. The book had been haunting me for years. I read it several times, recommended it for several places, but it was not used anywhere. And suddenly, my dream came true in Debrecen. If only all realizations turned out so well...

Human dignity? Fundament. Right. It is an obligation to respect it. No matter if one is Hungarian, gipsy, coloured, Jewish, Muslim, Christian, gay, married, homeless, liberal, illiberal, healthy, dying, whatever – all deserve equal treatment and equal rights. And if we are all equal, no one's dignity is hurt.

HOSPICE ÉS PALLIATÍV TERÁPIÁS OSZTÁLY




One of the greatest achievements of the Field of Dignity Programme is that – by raising social awareness – it has significantly contributed to the creation of a 20-bed Hospice and Palliative Therapeutic Ward. The background of the ward's multidisciplinary staff is provided jointly by the hospital's existing professionals (licensed physicians of the clinical centre of the university, skilled and experienced nurses, constantly available psychologist, pastor, physiotherapist and dietician). Their work is supported by volunteers, too, who become professional caregivers through completing accredited trainings.

The goal of the hospice activity is to ease the physical and mental suffering of terminal cancer patients. The Debrecen palliative team – specialists, specialised nurses, specialised psychologists, a mental hygiene professional, a pastor, a physiotherapist, social workers and trained volunteers – make an effort day to day so that patients may hold on to their human dignity in the final stage of their lives.

My father was transferred to the Debrecen Hospice Foundation's Hospice and Palliative Therapeutic Ward because of his terminal illness. When we first arrived, the door of the lift opened, and I caught sight of a group shot in the shape of a yellow heart on the wall, taken at the Great Forest Stadium. When I looked at my father I was beset by an elevated feeling as well as a deep pain... He managed to finish his life on earth in dignity.

VOLUNTEER WORK IN HOSPICE



The volunteer training aims to train helpful people who — under professional supervision — can provide physical and mental support to patients and their families in the course of the disease and grief. The training is organized by the Clinical Centre of the University of Debrecen, with the involvement of experienced experts who provide excellent performance in the care of patients with terminal illness. The training of hospice volunteers is organized continuously; the training is launched twice a year. Helpful volunteers may only work in the hospice system if they have completed this training. "Volunteerism is like a gift for me: I enter the ward, sit down beside a patient, we talk, and they gift me their trust — I can be part of their story, and they are pleased to be heard by someone" — says Cintia, a volunteer of the Debrecen Hospice House Foundation. The young lady has been caring since 2017 for patients with terminal illnesses, making their last months more pleasant and bearable.

DEBRECEN HOSPICE HOUSE FOUNDATION

The major task of Debrecen Hospice House Foundation is to form people's mindset. Several years of background work was the driving force behind the implementation of the Hajdú-Bihar County hospice service, that was launched in Debrecen with a 20-bed, inpatient hospice ward, in addition to home care service: the foundation's activity focuses on life-end dignity, the public acceptance of escorting patients on this journey, as well as the concept that every moment is valuable. The foundation's colleagues – together with specialists and volunteers – work day by day together to make hospice and palliative approach – via thy symbolism of the yellow daffodil– wide-known for as many people as possible, and facilitate life with dignity.
